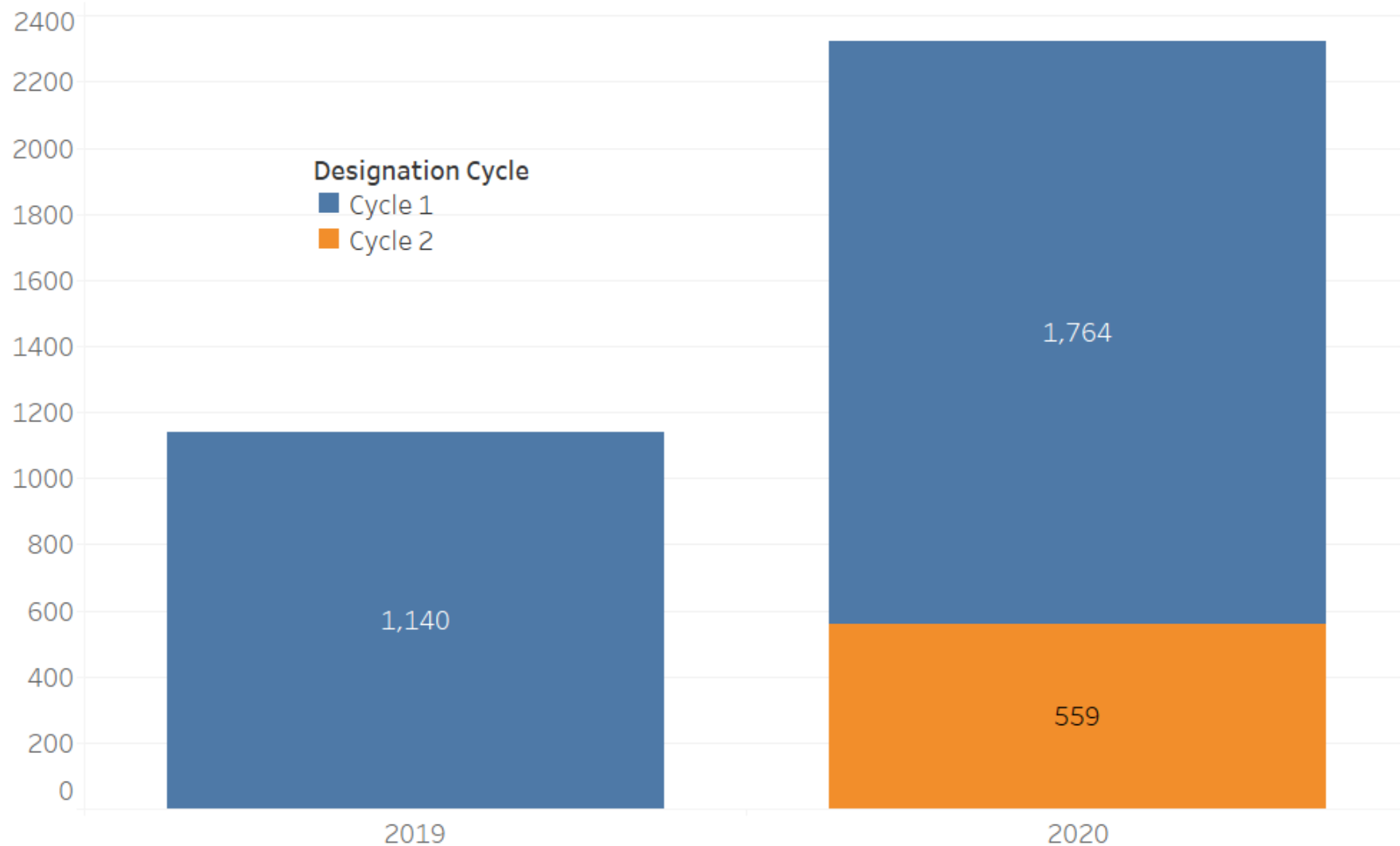

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EC is growing in more ways than one:

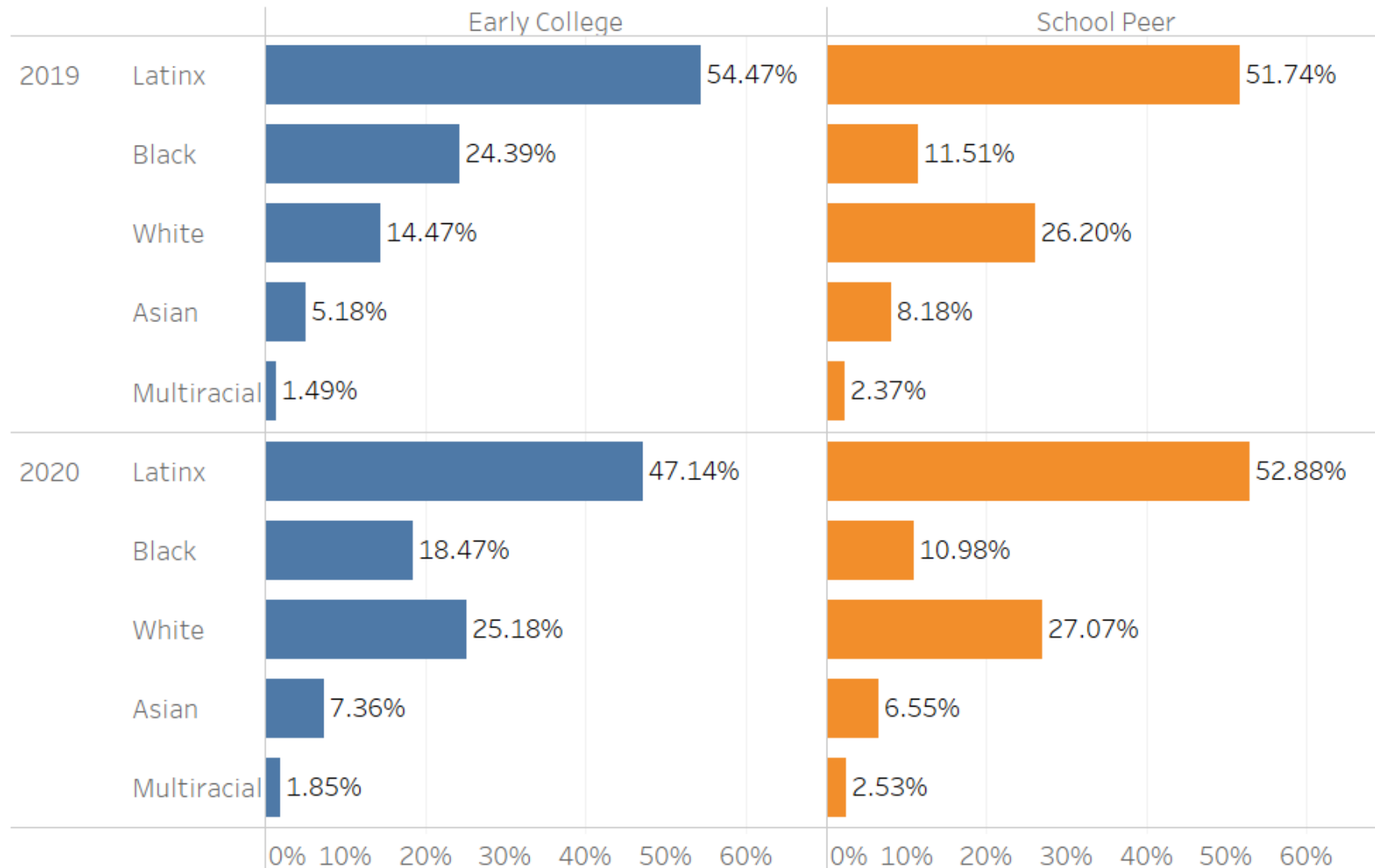
Participation by Year and Designation Cycle (9th-12th)

The majority of EC students are students of color:

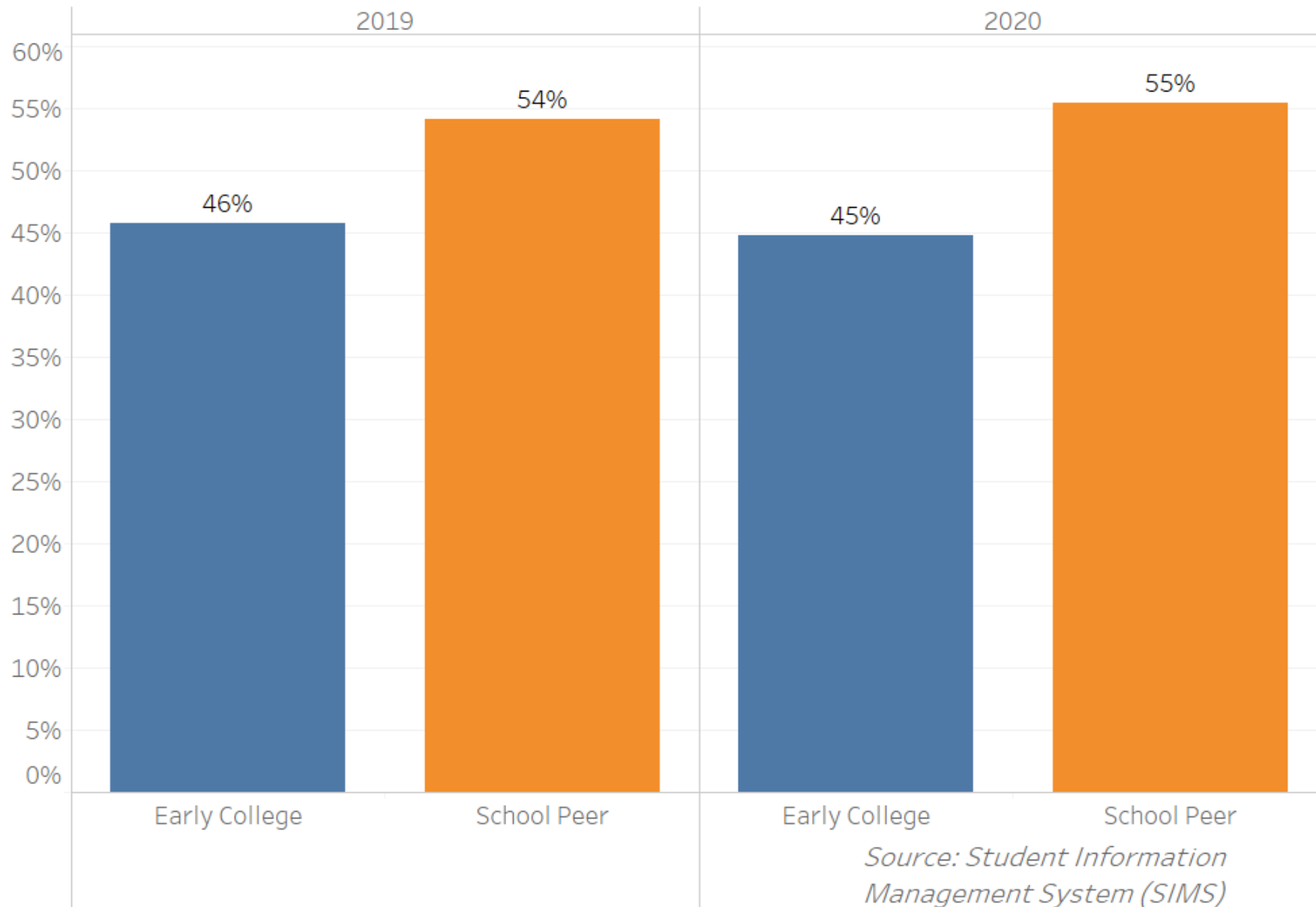
Racial Breakdown by Year (9th-12th)

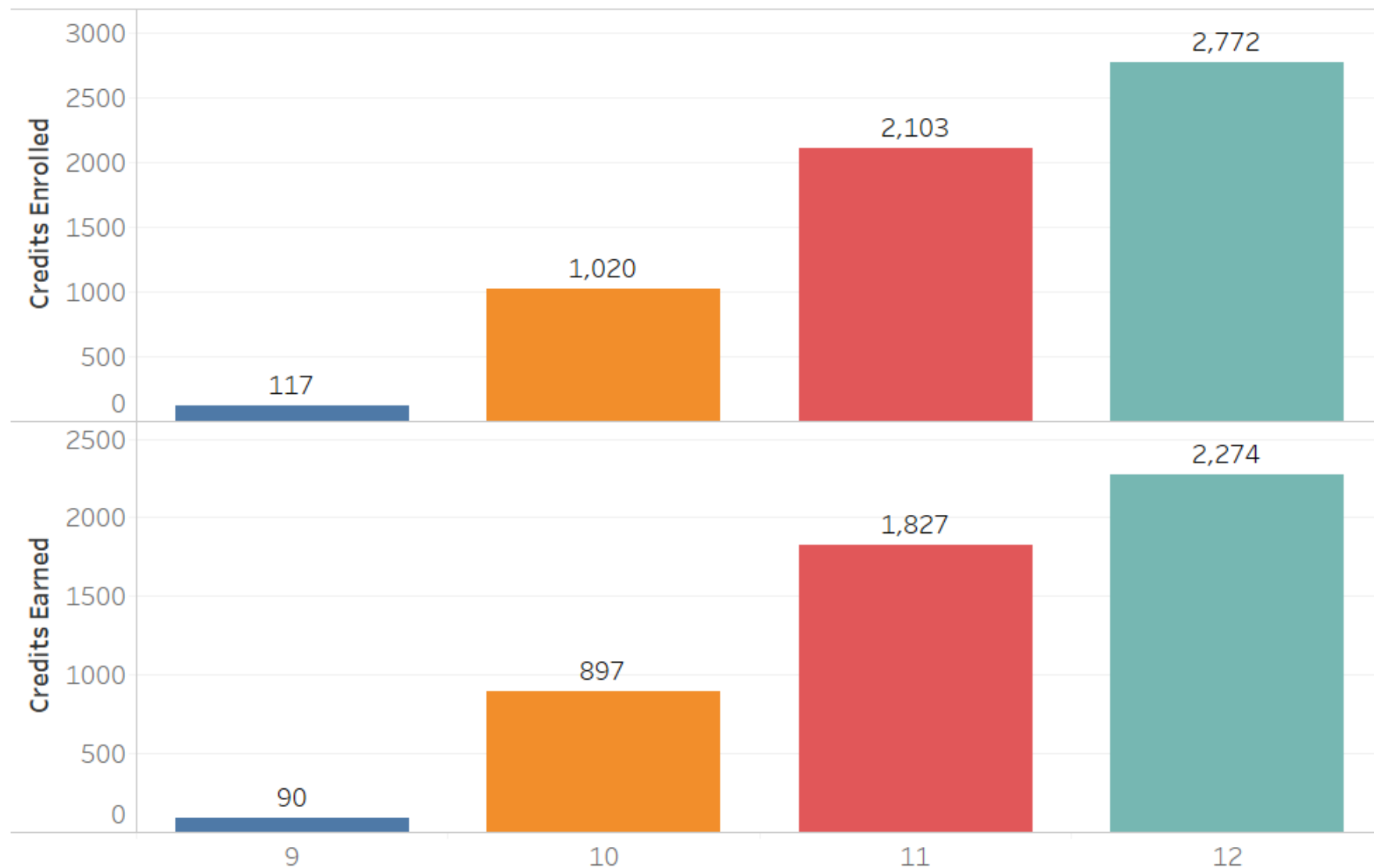
EC enrolls fewer economically disadvantaged students:

5,000 Credits earned at 85% pass rate saved families \$1 million:

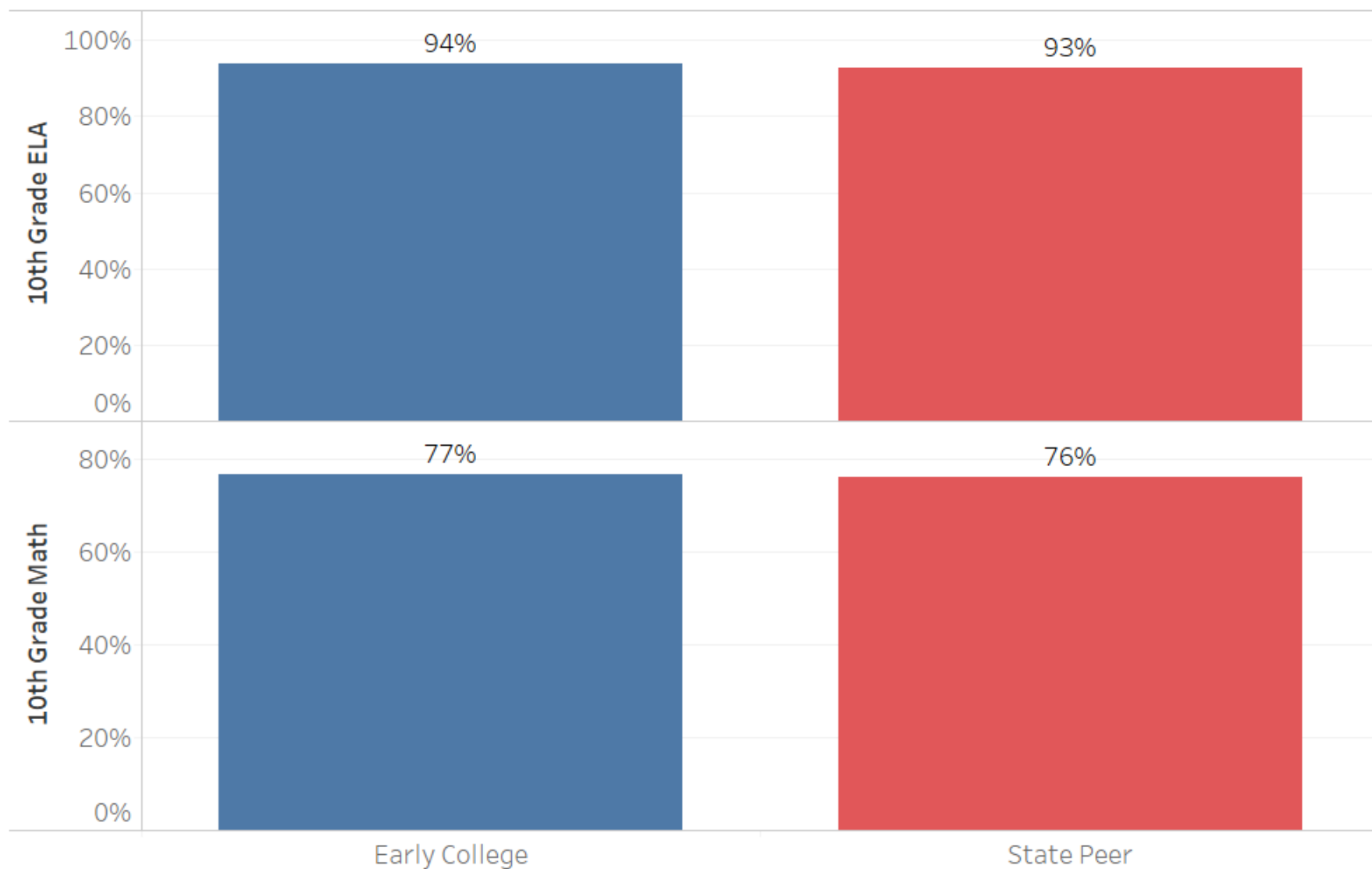
Credits Enrolled and Earned by 2019 (9th-12th)

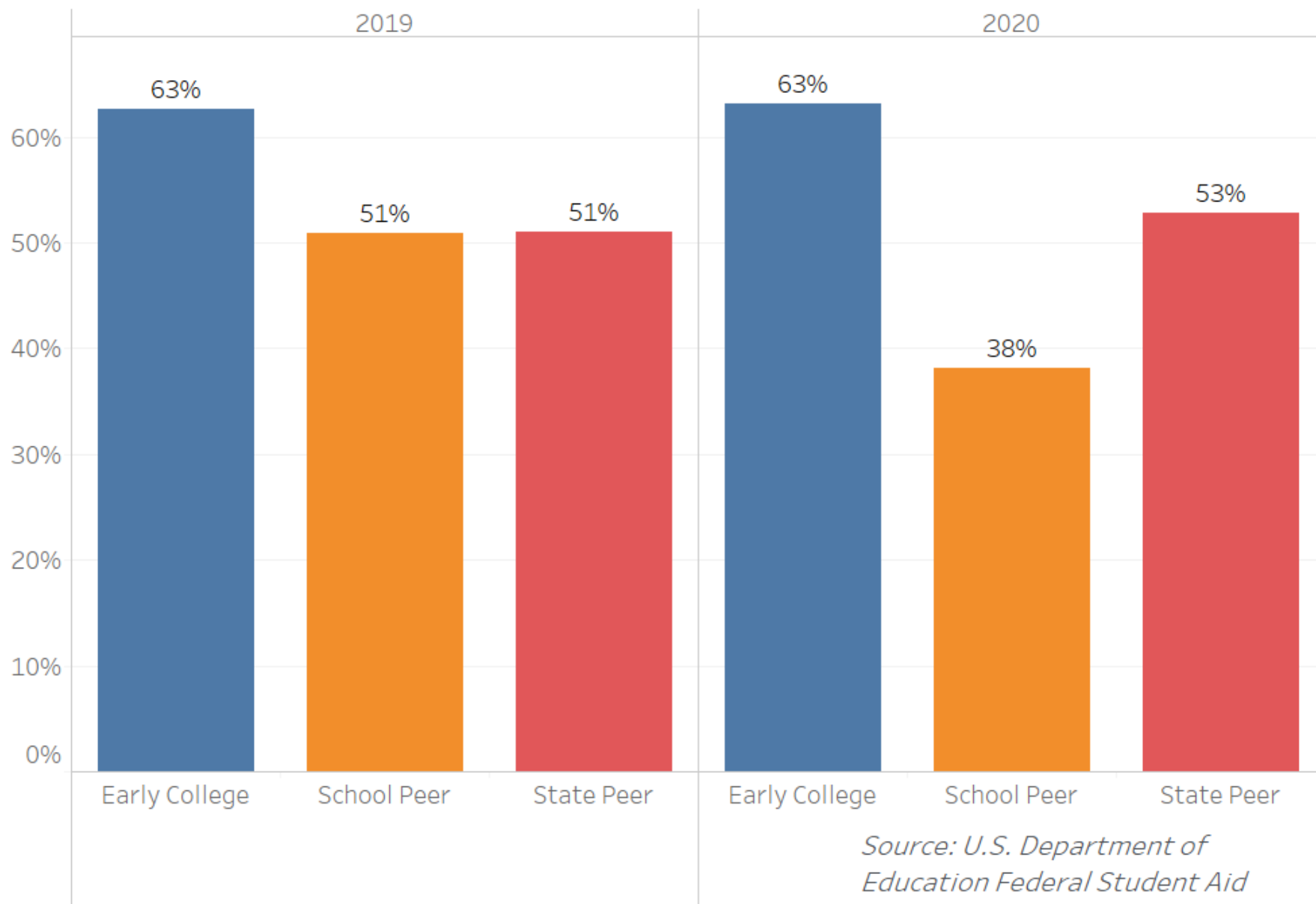

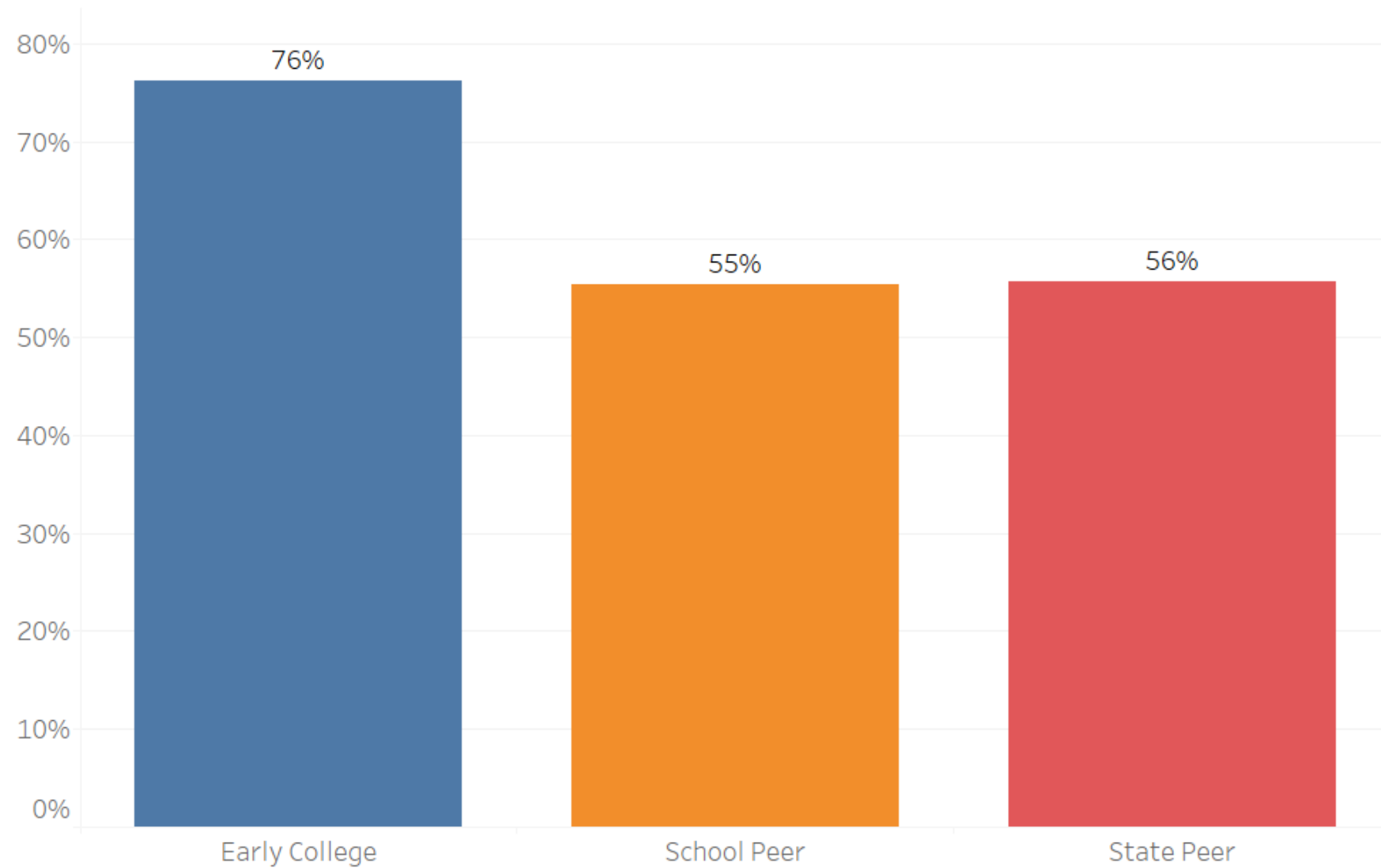
EC buffered from COVID-19 related dip in FAFSA completions:

EC high school grads attend college at a 20 percentage point higher rate:

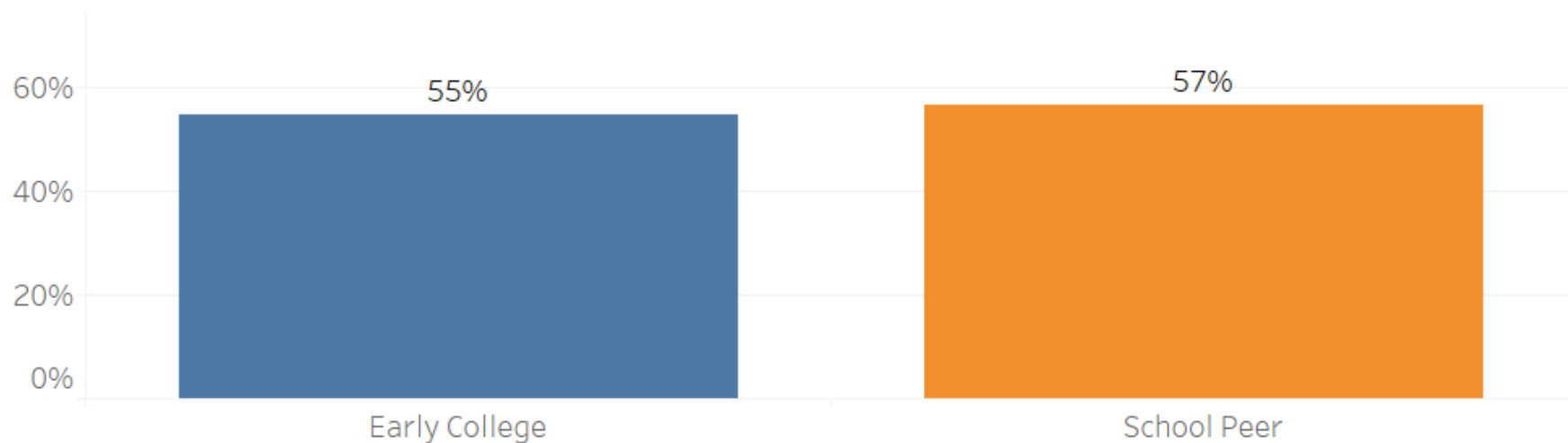
College Enrollment Within 6 Months of Graduating from High School



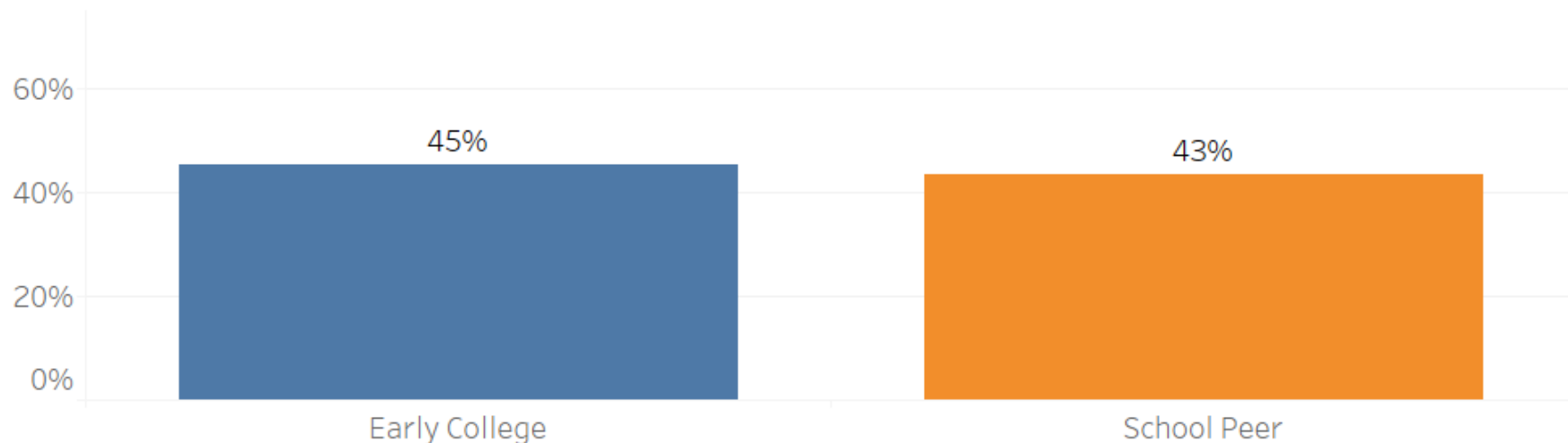

4-Year Colleges (Of Those Enrolled)



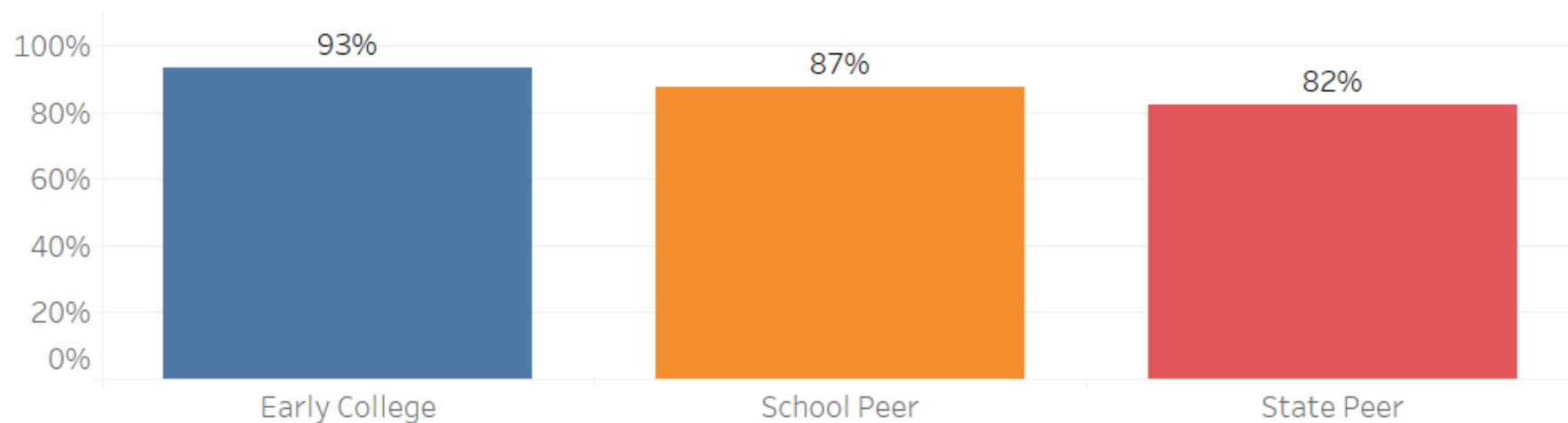
2-Year Colleges (Of Those Enrolled)



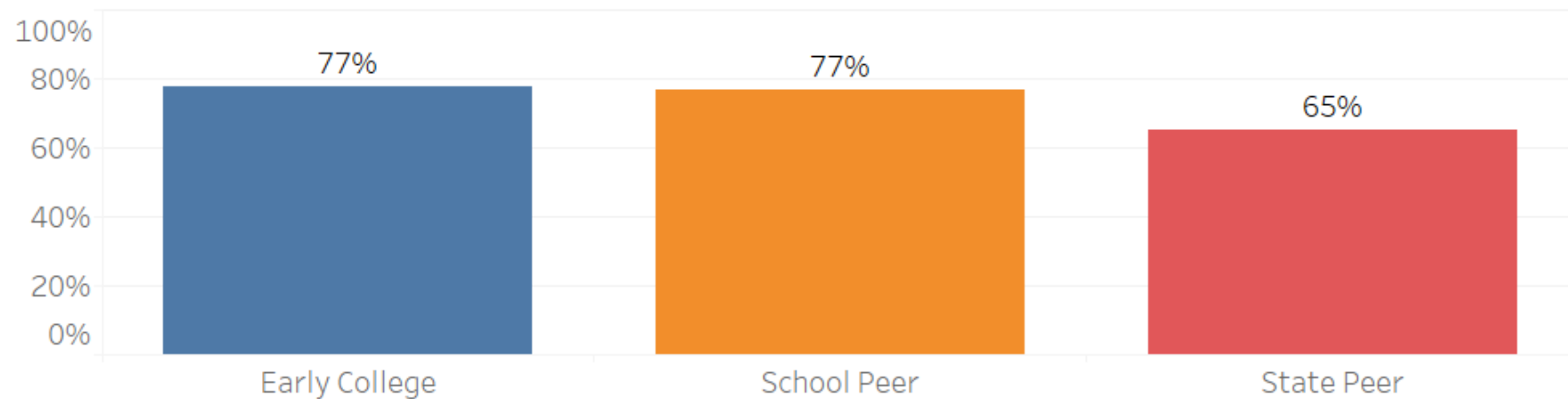
